Naperville 203's [SUCCESS family organization](#) and the Diversity & Inclusion Department proudly celebrate Black History Month. Black History Month is an annual celebration of the achievements of Black Americans and a time for recognizing the central role of Black people in the story of the United States of America.

Founded by historian Carter G. Woodson, Black History Week was first celebrated on Feb. 12, 1926, to commemorate and celebrate the contributions to our nation made by people of Black African descent. The time frame coincides with the birthdays of abolitionist Frederick Douglass and President Abraham Lincoln.

During the U.S. bicentennial in 1976, Black History Week was expanded to a month-long celebration. Since then, February is recognized as National African-American History Month (also known as Black History Month).

We acknowledge that one month is not sufficient in honoring the contributions and achievements of Black Americans. Ultimately, we want all students - regardless of individual characteristics and group memberships - to see themselves meaningfully reflected in the curriculum and to have an opportunity to learn about the experiences and contributions of others. This ongoing work is a part of Naperville 203's [Comprehensive Equity Plan](#), which continues to drive our efforts to ensure that we achieve our district mission for all students
